

member dies in armed robbery

Custodian Charles Edward Galloway died on Monday, December 23 after being shot during an armed robbery. Galloway, who worked at WS for one year, will be remembered by colleagues for his dedication to his work. "Charles is irreplaceable," said head of custodial staff Rebecca Mullins. "He was a jack-of-all trades who always had something nice to say to everyone."

Galloway was attacked when washing his car at a gas station in Temple Hills, Maryland. Police were unable to identify Galloway's body until December 26 because the gunman took both his wallet and Ford SUV. For three days, which included Christmas, Galloway's wife did not know of the incident or where to find him.

"Both his wife and mother called here [school] that evening when he didn't come home," said Mullins. "They knew how much he loved his work so they thought he may have come up here."

At school, Galloway worked in the foreign language

and English hallways, honored teachers' requests for furniture and often helped during lunch shifts. Administrators and staff always appreciated his

willingness to take on any job.
"When I picked up the radio to ask for something, he'd be the first to answer, and always with a polite 'yes ma'am'," said sophomore administrator Brenda Aiken.
"Most of the time, he'd already done a task before we


even knew it was a problem."

Galloway extended his help and care to students too. He often spent time in the gym talking to the boys' varsity basketball team and offering his encouragement to the

players.
"During our practices he would talk to us about how we were doing and what we were working on," said senior basketball player Drew Murray. "I think he really loved basketball."

Outside of school, Galloway was the father of three children: a 14-year-old daughter, a 5-year old son and a

The Advanced Placement diploma, awarded to students with enough Advanced Placement (AP) credits to meet the College Board's requirements, will be eliminated next year.

Getting the AP diploma requires a three or higher on the exam in five classes, including a math, science, English, social studies, and an elective; information that colleges can get without knowing that a student has the diploma.

"It really meant nothing," said career center coordinator Susan

Rexford.

The past three years, I have been mooching off Fairfax Countyfor my TI-83 calculators. But I can no longer do that and this year, I had to buy my own calculator. And so at the beginning of the year I went on a quest for a TI-83 calculator. It's funny how fast stores sell out of them.

After going to Staples, Wal-mart, and finally Target, I sucked it up and paid the extra 30 dollars for a TI-83 Plus Silver

on controversial topic Club educates student body

We have all heard the story of Matthew Shepard, the 21-year-old college student who was tied to a fence in Laramie, Wyoming, pistol-whipped, then left for dead in the freezing night—all because he was gay.

Now students at WS are taking steps to make sure such a crime like this never happens again.

Senior Lianna Carrera recently formed the Straight and Gay Alliance (SAGE) to break down straight/gay barriers and offer support to those who feel isolated because of their sexual orientation.

Though SAGE is the first club at WS to support gay rights, this is not the first time that students have formed clubs dealing with more controversial issues.

In 1999 several students formed the Prisoners of

Conscious club, advocating worldwide human rights. Though that club is not currently active at WS, it proved that even high school students can feel passionately about

a particular social issue.

Some may believe that high school is not an appropriate place to discuss an issue like homosexuality, or that students lack the maturity to discuss such a personal and hotly debated subject.

But the high school years are when beliefs on many different subjects, such as homosexuality, are formed and solidified. This makes high school the perfect place for people to try educating others about what homosexuality is, and more importantly, what it isn't.

One of SAGE's goals is to offer support to the gay population at WS. This is especially important since the suicide rate is high among teenagers, especially those who feel ostracized because of their sexual preferences. In 1999, suicide was the third leading cause of death in 15-24 year-olds—11.4 of every 100,000 persons. For adolescents aged 15 to 19, there were 1,802 suicide deaths among 19,146,000 adolescents. These numbers cannot be ignored.

SAGE is not trying to promote homosexuality, turn

SAGE is not trying to promote homosexuality, turn you into a homosexual, or take away any of your beliefs.

They are simply trying to break the vicious cycle of homophobia and create a net of support for gay students. Maybe the members of SAGE will be able to prevent a student from becoming another Matthew Shepard.





The end of the diploma doesn't mean WS failed.

"The number of students getting the diploma has expanded, and certain groups of outstanding students have been very successful," said guidance coordinator Eleanor Saslaw.

The school and student body will likely feel no effects of the change, especially if the school board just replaces the AP diploma, which was intended as a goal to meet for students in AP schools. The College Board was testing to determine if it was an appropriate award for students reaching the pinnacle of the AP program.

Even without the diploma, WS will have the AP program to provide higher level classes.

"It's important that students have options," said Saslaw. "Our students have a wide variety of interests and should be able to pursue whatever dreams they have."


"The Ring" is unique in its category of scary movies because it's not about a gory insane killer; it instead involves a complex story that keeps you enthralled until the last minute.

After around three weeks into the season the whole team sits down and votes




Senior Mike Watson gets called out of bounds; Watson won the match by a pin.


