



Two years running and two years rain-




Other problems include the roof, classroom windows that were installed when the school was built in 1966; and mold that many students and teachers are allergic to.








The crowd sang along to hits like "Me and My Gang," "Blessed Broken Road" and "Bob That Head." The band even managed

The 2007 graduate, who played backup quarterback in his first season at UVA and as a starter in the first two games this season, was dismissed from the team by the UVA Athletic Director after "violating the terms of his probation for underage drinking," according to The

Mike Riley, OSU's head football coach, is friends with UVA Coach Al Groh. The Portland, Oregon newspaper speculated that the friendship could be one reason Lalich ended up at Oregon State

The Oracle tried several times via phone and e-mail to contact Todd Lalich, Peter's father, for comment. The elder Lalich did not return messages left by a student

The Oregonian reported that Peter Lalich wanted to transfer to a college that used the quarter system so that he would be eligible to play sooner.

Riley told The Oregonian that he was confident about giving Lalich a shot at playing football for OSU.

"The people I talked to fell like this was a guy who deserved another opportunity, and I feel very good about it, I didn't want to compromise the program in any way, and I don't think we are."

OSU, according to *The Oregonian*, says Lalich must sit out the remainder of the 2008 season, and will have two years of eligibility remaining. He will be eligible for the full OSU football schedule in 2009, even though he started two games for the Cavaliers this season.


